I have been busy travelling around POMS infected areas interviewing oyster growers and completing the POMS Mortality Survey in conjunction with Christine Crawford and Sarah Ugalde. This survey is part of a joint project being undertaken by IMAS and Biosecurity Tasmania to collect information on the POMS event from the previous 2 summers in those infected growing areas. As mentioned earlier, the results of this survey will be presented at our Industry Forum on the 21st June at Midway Point Tavern.

I think this Forum will be an excellent opportunity for all oyster growers in Tasmania to gather information and to share knowledge gained. This is just as important for those growers in areas not yet affected by POMS as well as those that have now been impacted for the past 2 summers.

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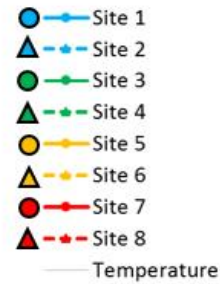
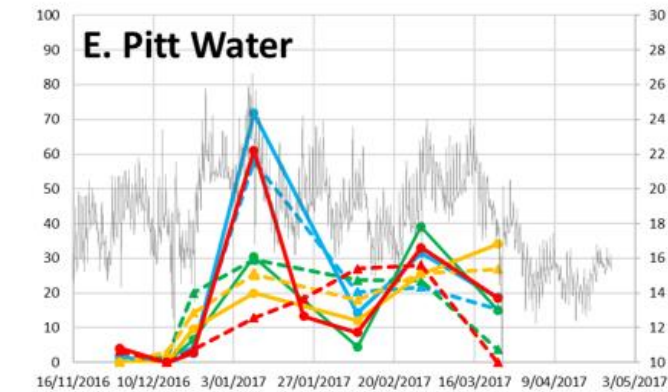
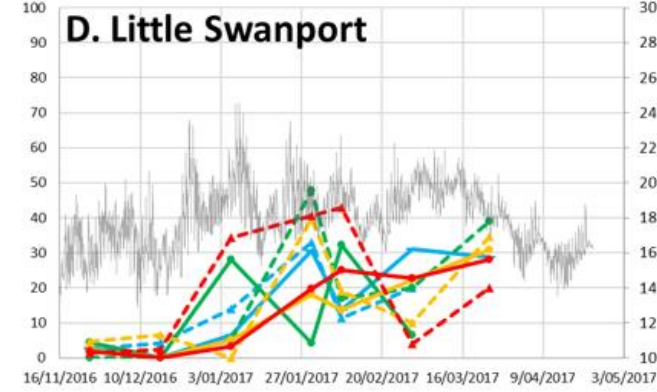
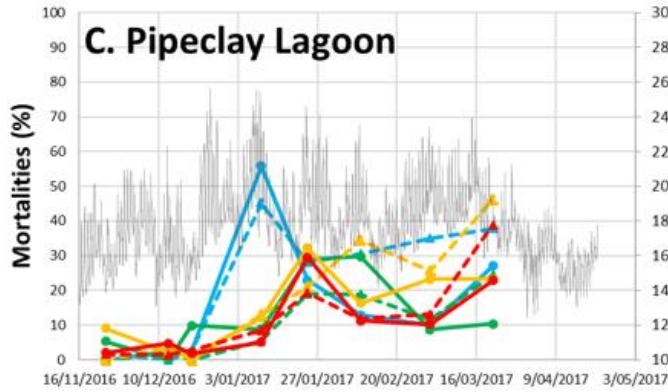
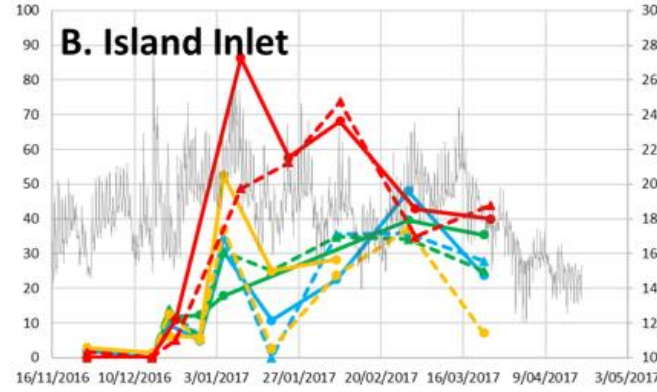
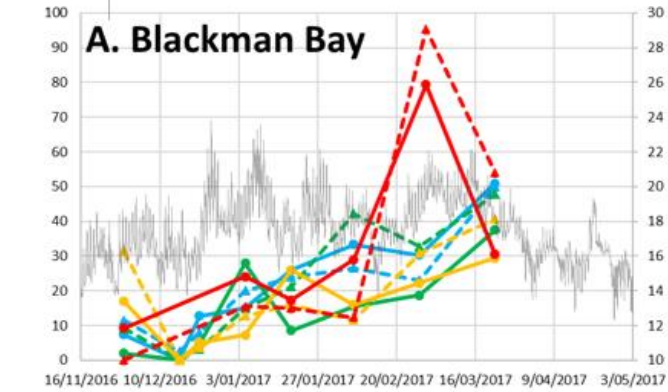
UTAS IMAS - CHRISTINE CRAWFORD and SARAH UGALDE

We have completed the majority of the POMS surveys and are about to start analysing the data. We hope to learn as much as we can about the POMS virus in Tasmania from the surveys, and for oyster growers to use this information in the management of their farms. The surveys have primarily asked questions around what died, where, when and why, along with environmental conditions and management practices. We will be looking for trends within bays and across growing areas.

The results of the window of infection research are summarised below and we will discuss these in more detail at the workshop. The temperature data is from our loggers and we will also present temperature data from The Yield sensors at the workshop, as well as looking at temperature profiles and mortality peaks in each growing area.
